AIIMS Partners with IREDA for Solarization of AIIMS New Delhi Campus

Indian Renewable Energy Development Agency Ltd. (IREDA) and All India Institute of Medical Sciences, New Delhi (AIIMS) have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) today, August 1, 2023, to initiate the technical assessment of the AIIMS New Delhi campus for converting it into one which is powered by solar energy. Towards this, IREDA will undertake a techno-commercial assessment of the AIIMS campus. The evaluation as provided in the MoU includes creating financial models, conducting pre-feasibility studies, preparing a detailed project report (DPR), assisting in the analysis of technical and commercial aspects related to project development, finalizing commercial and contracting arrangements, and defining performance indicators. By engaging in this partnership and implementing solar power projects, AIIMS aims to significantly reduce its electricity expenditure while concurrently minimizing its carbon footprint with the help of IREDA. The MoU was signed at AIIMS, New Delhi, by Chairman & Managing Director (CMD), IREDA, Shri Pradip Kumar Desai and AIIMS Director Dr. M. Srinivas, in the presence of senior officials of both organizations. AIIMS has installed a 9 Kilowatt Rooftop Solar plant at its New Delhi campus, which was dedicated by CMD, IREDA and Director, AIIMS today. The Minister of State for New and Renewable Energy and Chemicals & Fertilizers, Shri Bhagwanth Khuba, could not be present physically but conveyed his congratulations and best wishes for the MoU signing and Solar Plant inauguration ceremony. Speaking about the partnership, CMD, IREDA stated: "We are happy to be associated with AIIMS, aligning our expertise in renewable energy with the medical institution's commitment to a sustainable future. Pakistan persists with covert war as a foreign policy tool, but desires immunity from terrorism on its soil

MORE than 50 people were killed and around 200 injured in the terror attack that took place on July 30 at a gathering of the Jamiat Ulema-e-Islam Fazi (JUI-F) in Pakistan's northwestern Bajaur district. The Islamic State Khorasan Province (ISKP) claimed responsibility for the attack. In the past, the Islamic State has carried out several attacks against the JUI-F; the prime reasons include the JUI-F's association with the Afghan Taliban and the Islamic State's opposition to the JUI-F's support to democracy in Pakistan. The recent attack on the JUI-F gathering in Bajaur, where nine Pakistani soldiers were killed, prompted a severe reaction from the Pakistani military. Tehreek-e-Jihad Pakistan (TJP), the latest player in Pakistan's terror landscape, claimed responsibility for that attack. The TJP maintains its affiliation with the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP), the deadly organisation that continues to conduct attacks targeting Pakistan's security forces.

likely because of two factors: Imran Khan has been repeatedly held responsible for the rise in terror attacks as his government tried to negotiate with the group and released more than 100 TTP prisoners, which added to the group's strength; the TTP has not shown any sign of willingness to compromise on its demands, which would be unacceptable to the state. Two, Pakistan takes the Afghan Taliban into confidence, and the latter take on the responsibility of controlling the group. This option has been explored in phases, and some cosmetic measures have been taken. Strong links between the Taliban and the TTP and the fact that the TTP draws inspiration from the Taliban and views them as role models are questions over the efficacy of this option. However, given the volatile situation in Pakistan, this option seems to be a possible choice for the regime. The third option is counter-insurgency military operations against the TTP. The military has previously conducted counter-terror operations — Zarb-e-Azb in 2014 and Radd-ul-Fasad in 2017. The operations did impact the TTP's numbers and its ability to carry out terror attacks, but the group sustained itself and eventually flourished with the Taliban's support. Despite the rising number of attacks by the TTP, the military response has been restrained due to four factors: counter-insurgency operations in the past led to significant displacement in the tribal areas; given the alarming economic crisis (and the misery caused by the military operation) will aggravate the financial stress on the country; military operations against the TTP have an immense potential for a blowback from the Afghan Taliban; and speculation regarding a conspiracy theory suggests that it might be intentional on the part of the military to not control the group's activities and leverage the security situation to attract US counter-terror aid and assistance. While the military will weigh its options vigilantly, the fact remains that Pakistan is engaged in the mire of its strategic choices. Pakistan continues to prioritise covert war as a foreign policy tool (vis-à-vis India and Afghanistan) but desires immunity from terrorism on its own soil. The rise of terrorism and expansion of the TTP are alarming and indicate serious security challenges not only for Pakistan but also for South Asia in the near future.

Tongue twist: English medium zips past Gujarati with 23% more schools

AHMEDABAD: In the battle between Gujarati and English medium schools in the state, the latter seems to be winning with a convincing margin and the success has been as easy as ABC. According to the education department data, from 2019 to 2022, against 224 applications seeking permission to open new Gujarati medium schools, there were 276 applications or 23% higher requests for English medium schools. The experts said that the phenomenal growth of English as a medium of instruction is spurred by the popular perception in the villages and towns that English-proficiency puts you on a par with the world and is a ticket to prosperity. The aspirations of small-town parents to see their wards getting a fair chance at better job prospects is one of the key factors driving the English-medium craze, they added. "Earlier, it was difficult to imagine that someone would travel more than five kilometres to primary or secondary level schools in non-urban areas. However, today several new English medium schools have students coming from as far as 10 km. The parents send their wards to schools in vans and school buses," he said. "English medium is often associated with admissions to better universities and courses and higher pay packages. So, I connect the trend with the aspirations of a new class of parents for whom investment in education is also a matter of status," said Archit Bhatt, president of the Progressive School Management Association. "It is a decision taken by parents, but they must also understand its flip side," he added. Priyavardan Korat, a GSHSEB member, said that the trend is the outcome of several factors and should be seen in that perspective only.
